Minister's Letter

To everything there is a season...

In 1959 the singer, songwriter Pete Seeger wrote the song, "Turn, Turn, Turn,". It became an international hit in 1965 when performed and recorded by "The Byrds". The words are based on the passage from Ecclesiastes 3:1-8 as found in the King James Bible – words often attributed to King Solomon, renowned of course for his wisdom.

The words are a statement of reality - a reality which is sometimes positive and sometimes negative. They recognise that life is not a bed of roses but neither is it a veil of tears. Each action, emotion, experience takes its place in the big picture. The timing of the good and the bad, the joyful and the sorrowful in each of our life journeys may be very different. The balance of the elements is also different. It is true that for some the scales seem very much tipped in favour of the good things whilst

others seem to gain more than their fair share of struggle.

The words are open to interpretation.

Seeger presented them as protest song - a plea for peace. The line "a time for peace" receives the addition of "I swear it's not too late."

We might look at the words and draw from them a sense of inevitability. Perhaps if all these things are going to happen – if they are all part of the plan, then we might as well just steel ourselves to these things and get on with life, making the best we can of the cards we are dealt. But the Christian faith is not one to give up and abandon ourselves or others to fate.

Fate is not a Christian concept. The idea that life is beyond our control and whatever we do we cannot influence its pattern or path is alien to Christ's way. Many of the decisions and choices we make in life impact on our experience and the path of our life — we are free to choose. But our Christian faith reminds us that, rather than being abandoned to fate, we have the privilege to lean into the love and mercy of God.

Prayer is a powerful and vital part of our faith journey and our relationship with God. Coming to God in times of sorrow and in times of Joy, breaking open our heart's

desire and allowing God to work in us and through us is a gift of grace which God gives us all. God promises to hear and to answer our prayers.

However, there is risk in prayer. In bringing our concerns, our fears and our hopes to God we must do so with the understanding that God's answer may not be the one we want or expect. Faith demands that we pray in faith that God will answer, in the manner that He knows to be right.

We need to come to God with the open faith of a child, trusting that God knows what is best in every situation. We can be assured that whatever we face, God is working through it all for our ultimate good. As Paul reminds us, in his letter to the Romans (8:28):

"We know that in all things God works for good with those who love him, those whom he has called according to his purpose."

God is with us – whatever we face – we are not abandoned to fate – we are held in God's love now, and for ever.

As we have continued to work as one church with two locations we agreed, at the Annual General Meeting, to only hold one

service each Sunday, either at Leiston or Saxmundham. Each month these services will include worship with Holy Communion, an Afternoon Service and normally one service (known as a hybrid service) led by elders and members of the congregation, and including a recorded address provided by one of our two ministers.

On months which include a fifth Sunday, we are working with our local Methodist friends to join for a united service at one of the churches either at Leiston, Saxmundham, Peasenhall or Knodishall. The next such service is on Sunday 31st August, beginning at 11:00 at Peasenhall Methodist Church.

Our church buildings can be a blessing and a challenge – you've heard it said before and no doubt we will say it again.



As many of you will already be aware we had a problem, back in May, with flooding at Leiston Church. The hot water heater under the sink in the upstairs kitchen sprung a leak, releasing a significant amount of water and damaging the hall ceiling and floor. Thanks to everyone who helped with the clear up, and to emergency plumber who

came out to disconnect, remove and seal off the pipework.

Marion has been working hard with the insurance company to sort replacement flooring and repairs as necessary. We hope to get these problems sorted as soon as possible.

In addition to repairs caused by flooding we are working on a development project for the Leiston Church Building, seeking support and grant funding from different sources to help develop and improve the facilities. We will be progressing with plans over the next couple of months. The ideas we have in mind will improve accessibility and upgrade the toilets and kitchen for wider church and community use.

In early June we were able to get the vestry cleared of a great deal of clutter and unwanted furniture. This will provide a more useful space to be used as a church office and base for the Town Pastors.
