Minister's Letter

More Than Just a Friendly Hello

“Therefore welcome one another as Christ has welcomed you, for the glory of God.”

Romans 15:7



Churches are often very good at talking about being “welcoming.” We print it on banners, put it on our websites, and say it from the front. And that’s a good thing! A smile at the door, a warm handshake, someone to show you where the coffee is - all of that matters. First impressions shape how people feel, and hospitality is a deeply biblical virtue.

But welcome is one thing, inclusion goes a step further. Though they are related, they aren’t quite the same thing. *Welcome* is the open door. *Inclusion* is having a real place at the table.

Think of it like hosting a dinner party. A guest who rings the bell is welcomed in: coat taken, drink offered, polite conversation made. But inclusion happens when they feel free to join the chatter around the table, help themselves to seconds, or even wash up at the end. It’s when they stop being “the guest” and start being “part of the family.”

Church can be like that too. We might welcome people in with smiles and tea and the news sheet. But inclusion happens when their voices are genuinely heard, their stories valued, their gifts shared. Inclusion isn’t just “letting people in.” It’s recognising that they belong—not as visitors, but as co-creators of the church community.

Romans 15:7 reminds us to “welcome one another as Christ has welcomed you.” And how has Christ welcomed us? Not as guests on probation, but as beloved children of God. Jesus didn’t just let people follow him politely from the edge of the crowd; he sat with them, ate with them, trusted them with ministry, gave them a voice. That’s inclusion.

True inclusion often happens in small, practical ways. It might mean giving someone a role, listening to their ideas, changing our language to make it easier for newcomers, or making sure leadership reflects the breadth of who we are. It’s also about being willing to *change* as a community, not expecting others to simply fit in to how things have always been.

A church can be warm and friendly without being truly inclusive. But a church that is both welcoming and inclusive reflects something of God’s kingdom: a place where

there are no outsiders, only fellow children of God, gathered around the same table. So perhaps the question for us isn't just, "Are we welcoming?" but, "Are we making room for people to belong?"

Leiston Hall Carpet

Saxmundham Chapel 175th Anniversary

Back in September (doesn't time fly) we celebrated 175 years since the opening of Saxmundham Chapel. The history of the church (its predecessors in Sweffling and Renham) in goes right back to 1650.

It was a joy and blessing to welcome folk to join in our celebration tea and open church on Saturday 6th September. There were various objects, documents and photographs on display, a self-guided tour, a timeline quiz, a sing-a-long of Sunday School hymns and, of course, plenty to eat.



A special celebration service was held on Sunday 7th September. Revd David led the service (which included some further fascinating facts). It was good to have the organ played by Revd Adam who also gave the address. More tea and cake followed.

On Monday 8th September we held an extra "Start The Week with A Cuppa" at which we were joined by members of the "Awake Suffolk Coastal" mission team. There was still plenty of cake to share.

Autumn Concert

Following our pattern, we held our Autumn mini concert and afternoon tea at Saxmundham Chapel on 18th October. The concert was entitled "As Time Goes By – Flavours from History" which turned out to be musical memories from Revd Adam and Gillian Earle. We had a varied and lively programme which included organ, piano and voice. There were organ arrangements of some familiar orchestral pieces, music made famous by Glenn Miller, a performance of the short musical "Jonah-Man Jazz" and a Sound of Music sing-a-long.



Afterwards (and you may well detect a common theme here). We shared a tasty tea of sandwiches and cake. It was good to welcome over twenty folk and donations amounted to over £100 towards the work of the church. Thankyou to everyone who supported the event.
